*The hardest heart sheds the first tears.

One of the young boys in the 7 thru 9 year old camp at AICM was a 'handful'! He started out being very quiet while observing all that was going on. Soon the quietness turned to defiance, a refusing to sit still and a desire not to participate in the camp activities. Even with this attitude we could see compassion and goodness in him waiting to come out. The problem was, how do we get him to make the change? Through prayer, patience and finding things for him to do that gave him purpose, he became involved, was helpful and even had fun! However, on the last day while in the line to get breakfast he became involved in a fight with another boy. When we pulled them apart there was a look of serious anger and sadness we had not seen before and was not what is seen in the eyes of a typical 9 year old.

When it was time to get on the van for the ride home to the Rez, this hardened, angry, and stubborn boy that originally did not want to participate, was the first to shed a tear and ask if he could stay. He did not want to go home! The story behind his actions speaks volumes on what his life must be like. And this is just one child and one story out of who-knows how many. I ask you to please pray for the children on the Rez and the pain and suffering they are going through. You do not need to know the details. Jesus knows their situation. Please pray for these children! We trust that the Holy Spirit will intervene for them through you. Thank you!

Comments from Dennis It was hot in June (yes, even in the White Mountains of Arizona!), but that did not stop the

planned 'Kingdom work". There were summer camps for the Native American kids AICM, bus outreach programs in Whiteriver and McNary, and Bible study and jail ministry programs in Whiteriver. There were also work projects to do on the property at AICM. One

of the projects I worked on was to paint the inside of a 4-bedroom house for the new incoming Executive Director. Another responsibility I had was to give the daily Bible message to the kids at the 7 thru 9 year old camp. It was challenging, but I loved every minute of it.

On a more serious note, I find that no matter how much time we spend with and around the Apache people I always seem to learn something new about them and their culture. The way they look at life is completely different then the way we (Anglos) do. It is the same with their religion and how they perceive the Creator. It is going to take a lot of studying and getting to know the people in the community in order to be versed in their ways and be able to be accepted. Even though most of the time we are treated with respect and Apache people have been polite, some Apaches still have animosity, distrust,

resentment and hostility toward 'White Men' that needs to be addressed.

Jesus is on the reservation. Many people 'believe in Jesus' but feel they can keep some of their Apache religious beliefs and customs. That is a hurtle that will take some time to overcome. (See Exodus verse below)

Weekly Bible Study goes on in Apache jail



Jail facility in Whiteriver, AZ on the White Mountain Apache Reservation. This facility is only about 2 years old.

Pastor Pete and Kim have being going into the Apache jail in Whiteriver for many years. They encourage, minister to, and study the Bible with the men and women prisoners each Monday. I had the privilege of going in with Kim last week. We entered a room housing 26 Apache women. Most were still in bed at 11AM. (Some were sleeping on mats on the floor as there were not enough beds.) We began talking with them and then shared some from our Bibles. A few of the women responded to us and soon many were speaking up with concerns, stories, and prayer requests. We found out that they gather together for a Bible Study each evening and 4 women had come to a saving knowledge of Jesus there in the jail. Praise God! I was impacted to learn that there are NO activities offered to these incarcerated women. They spend ALL their time (night and

day) in this room together. They occasionally get to go outside (once a week) to the small yard shown in the photo. Wow! What a hard way to sober up (most are in on drug or alcohol charges) and 'serve your time'! Praise God that they can have Bibles (but no pens to journal) and His Spirit is at work there! I had the chance to pray with and encourage a couple of women individually. One of them will be in jail until December!

Please pray for these women. Listed here are their specific prayer requests:

- that they would continue their daily Bible Study together
- that they take this time to 'be still and know that He is God'
- that God would be with their children, husbands and parents during this time that they are incarcerated
- that God would be with the family of a fellow inmate who was recently released and subsequently committed suicide
- that they would have favor with judges and be released quickly
